Questions 1, 4 and 7 (Varied Fluency)

Expected Identify two sentences which include the correct use of adverbs to indicate degrees of possibility. Use of simple or multi-clause sentences which usually includes two adverbs.

Greater Depth Identify two sentences which include the correct use of an adverb to indicate degrees of possibility. Use of multi-clause sentences which usually include two or more adverbs that are not limited to degrees of possibility.

Questions 2, 5 and 8 (Varied Fluency)

Developing Tick two adverbs which can be used to complete a given sentence. Use of simple sentences with one or two simple clauses which includes one adverb.

Expected Tick two adverbs which can be used to complete a given sentence. Use of simple or multi-clause sentences which usually include two adverbs.

Greater Depth Tick two adverbs which can be used to complete a given sentence. Use of multi-clause sentences which usually include two or more adverbs that are not limited to degrees of possibility.

Questions 3, 6 and 9 (Application and Reasoning)

Developing Rewrite a sentence using a different adverb which changes the degree of possibility. Use of simple sentences with one or two simple clauses which includes one adverb.

Expected Rewrite a sentence using a different adverb in a different place which changes the degree of possibility. Use of simple or multi-clause sentences which usually include two adverbs.

Greater Depth Rewrite a sentence using two different adverbs in different places which change the degree of possibility. Use of multi-clause sentences which usually include two or more adverbs that are not limited to degrees of possibility.
